stakeholder representatives are These entrusted with executing the work of the National Registry of Artists and Cultural Workers which manages the Mentoring by the Masters Programme.

The Mentoring by the Masters program continues to focus on the core areas of work of the Culture Division of the Ministry of Community Development, Culture and the Arts, i.e.:

- Heritage Preservation
- Festival Development
- Development of the Cultural Industries
- Development of the Competencies in the Visual, Literary and Performing Arts
- Professional Arts Development

The program includes a series of workshops led by the selected five (5) artists and cultural workers who mentor developing practitioners in their respective fields for eighty (80) contact hours over a two month period. Our mentors were charged with the task of developing their own training schedules and courses, attuned to their own teaching and delivering styles with the support of facilitators where it was deemed

applicable. This allowed for participants to not only be taught by their requisite Mentor, but also meet, interact and even network with industry professionals and artists alike. We continue to have a high application response and over eighty (80) individuals were able to participate in the programme.

This award ceremony serves to respectfully acknowledge the invaluable contributions of the mentors who are:

- Glendon Morris: Copper Arts (Development of the Competencies in the Visual, Literary and Performing Arts)
- Kenwyn Crichlow: Professional Development (Development of the Cultural Industries)
- Ravindra Nath Maharaj: Festival Development
- Rudylynn De Four Roberts: Heritage Architecture Preservation (Heritage Preservation)
- Stephen Derek: Carnival Arts (Professional Arts Development)

It is significant to note that we at the Culture Division understand the interconnectivity of our projects and the integral role they play in fostering an appreciation and interest in the Creative and Cultural Sector as a career. The Mentoring by the Masters Programme is but one key initiative in our slate of activities geared towards developing and empowering the creative citizenry of Trinidad and Tobago.



Glendon is the second of three sons of the legendary Ken Morris. He attended Barataria E.C. School and Osmond High School in San Juan. During the holiday periods in elementary school, as early as ten years old, he assisted his father, Ken Morris, with carnival costumes and began learning the art of copper sculpture. At the age of twenty Glendon and his father were chosen together with Wayne Barkley and Carlyle Chang to represent Trinidad and Tobago in the Sphere of Art at the Canadian Exposition in Montreal, Canada.

In 1968 Glendon migrated to Canada, where he trained in a highly skilled area of tool and die sinking, Sculpture of Metal Moulds for Reproduction, at Compo Industries of Canada. On his return to Trinidad and Tobago in 1983, he managed the tool and die department of Y De Lima and Co. Ltd. for fifteen (15) years. His last major work was the Trinidad and Tobago Police belt buckle.

Glendon is certified by the Metal Industries Company (M.I.C.) in physical metallurgy heat treatment of metals, and design for components of machines and equipment. He was also the first band leader of the Belmont Original Stylish Sailors (De B.O.S.S.). His designs have achieved the band of the year title in the small band category for many years. He is presently the band leader of the Belmont Jewels. His designs include metal work and his craft has been well appreciated in Carnival over the years. He is also a member of the National Carnival Bands Association and in 2006 he was chosen to visit Nigeria to observe and make recommendations for their newly developing Carnival. He returned to Calabar, Nigeria in 2008, together with three other members of the mas fraternity, and conducted a workshop in the use

of materials, designs, and construction of small, medium and large costumes.

Carnival judges of mas have enhanced their skills by his lectures in past years. Glendon works at his studio located at 107B Belmont Circular Road, Belmont. His art in copper sculpture is very much in demand. His copper murals can be found throughout Trinidad, and are displayed in the University of the West Indies, Piarco Airport, Kapok Hotel, Pheonix Park Gas Company, Angostura, and private collections. He is also a prominent designer/artist's to the Eric Williams Memorial Foundation.



**Professional Development** 

Kenywyn Crichlow is a practicing studio artist who has participated in solo exhibitions in Trinidad and Tobago and internationally from 1981 to present. His paintings have been included in every major group exhibition of Trinidad and Tobago and Caribbean fine art since 1985. Some of his work is a part of the treasured National Art Collection of Trinidad and Tobago

Mr. Crichlow has taught at every level of the Education system in Trinidad and Tobago;

primary and secondary schools, Teachers College and at the University of the West Indies. He has also taught fine art and design at community development level as well as in his painting studio, which for a time functioned as an atelier. Ken is the founding Lecturer of the Visual Arts Programme of the Department of Creative and Festival Arts, Faculty of Humanities and Education, University of the West Indies. He held the role of the Coordinator of the same between 1987-2007.

Kenwyn is also a key researcher on the history of visual arts in the Caribbean. His work in this area has been the subject of public lectures, feature presentations and publications. He has collaborated with the Tobago Museum to develop research on Colonial Fortifications and Sugar Production Architecture in Tobago.

**Festival Development** 

Ravindra Nath Maharaj, known as Raviji, returned from India in 1983 and in 1984 he started activities at Longdenville Mandir where he had been serving before he had left for India. He shaped the mandir as a community centre for worship, learning, performing arts, community care, youth development and fraternity. The mandir attracted people from all over the country and influenced the development of other mandirs. He also started working with the Hindu Seva Sangh, organising


Residential Youth Training Camps. These camps focused on Hindu History, Hindu World View and Culture, Ramayan, Gita, physical development and discipline. These camps continue today under various groups but mainly though the Hindu Swayamsevak Sangh which is led by youths who were trained by Raviji.

In 1985 he started a project called Mantra of the Year which ran for 20 years (1985-2004). Through the Mandir Outreach Programs these mantras of the years were taken to people all across the country and served as an 'anthem' for the year. The complete collection of Mantras of the years has been recorded on 2 CDs and they have been printed in many publications and sung at local and international programs.

Raviji has been active in the Divali Nagar from its inception. He has been the Theme Director for over ten years with the responsibility for the creative and thematic development of Divali Nagar. Among his many accomplishments he has played the role of founder/organiser of a host of annual events in the East Indian

community. He has also been a chairman and member of notable institutions and organisations ranging from a children's home to the Carifesta Organisation Committee.

Raviji is a recipient of the Hummingbird Silver Medal, the Government of India Award for Community Service at the International Conference on Hindi, London, a Rotary Award and Divali Nagar Award for community service and numerous other awards for his service in the community both locally and internationally.









Rudylynn De Four Roberts attended Howard University in Washington DC., where she obtained a Bachelor of Architecture in 1974. She is a Past President and Fellow of the Trinidad and Tobago Institute of Architects and is a registered Architect in Trinidad and Tobago.

Her first love is for Historic Restoration and she has devoted much of her life to restoring historic buildings and lobbying for the preservation of the built Heritage in Trinidad and Tobago.

Rudylynn established and served as Director of the Trinidad and Tobago's Government Historic Restoration Unit for twelve years, before starting her own private architectural practice, De Four, Farmer and Associates Ltd. and now Rudylynn Roberts Architects Ltd.

As a founding member of Citizens for Conservation she was actively involved in researching and drafting The National Trust Act of Trinidad and Tobago and was a member of the Trust's first two Executive Councils. She is president of The International Council of Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS) Trinidad and Tobago National Committee.

Her experience in the Field of Preservation allowed her to serve on several Government committees in various administrations, such as the Queen's Park Savannah Management Committee, Archaeology committee, Restoration action Committee, and represent her country at several conferences and symposia, delivering lectures and networking for the heritage preservation movement.









Stephen Derek was born in 1952, at Buller Street in Woodblock not far from George Bailey's Mas Camp. For a boy with a passion for mas, there was no better place in the world to be as he was able to learn to draw and design mas from the legendary George Bailey.

After his mentor's death in 1970, Stephen Derek got deeply involved in carnival and his first breakthrough in the mas scenario came in 1972, when he designed and produced costumes for Alvin Bailey's band Tales in Verse. From then onwards Steve (as he is familiarly known) became involved in the mas making process, wirebending, aluminum, leather, cane, fibreglass skills, moulding, carving to such a high degree that he can now be termed as "the complete masman " having fully mastered all aspects of costume building and design.

In 1978 he produced his first carnival band 'D Midas Touch 'which placed second in the Band

of The Year Medium Category and continued to produce masterpiece after masterpiece year after year winning the Band of the Year Medium for thirteen consecutive years. His adult individual portrayals have won Queen of Carnival and Individual of the year on many occasions. His junior carnival portrayals have won the Junior King and Queen of carnival and Individual of the year also.


He exports the carnival worldwide by designing and producing bands and costumes for Trinistyle Carnivals throughout the Caribbean, St. Thomas, St Marten, Guyana, Canada, Boston, Atlanta, New York, Houston, Miami, England and South Africa to name a few. He has become a year round Masman moving from one carnival to another show casing his creative genius and technique for the world to see and admire.

His creative works over the years have received accolades, tributes and awards from carnival organisations worldwide, but his most memorable is his Humming Bird Medal Silver which he received for his outstanding contribution to the Carnival Artform in the Sphere of Mas in 1992.



# **Our Masters of 2015**


We would like to recognize the mentors who contributed to the success of the third instalment of the Mentoring by the Masters Programme in 2015.



Mr. Albert Laveau is the Artistic and Managing Director of the Trinidad Theatre Workhsop where he became one of the best-known actors in Trinidad. He is perhaps best known for his role as The Devil in Walcott's "Ti-Jean and his Brothers". Mr. Laveau is an accomplished director as well and it is for this reason that he was chosen to mentor participants in the area of Developmental Theatre.



Mr. Narcenio Gomez, better known as Señor Gomez is one of the leading wire benders (sculptors) in Trinidad and Tobago. He has been designing, bending wire and making costumes for over 50 years both in Trinidad and internationally. Mr Gomez mentored participants in wire bending and mas making skills in the area of Carnival Arts.



Mr. Paul Keens-Douglas is self-published author, performer and motivational speaker. He has produced several radio and television storytelling series, and is the founder/producer of the annual Tim Tim Storytelling Show and the Carnival Talk Tent which focuses on the oral traditions. Mr. Keens- Douglas was chosen to share his expertise in Storytelling and Oratory Traditions.



WINSFORD DEVINE

Mr. Winsford Devine's gift for writing lyrics has earned him a Hummingbird Silver medal. Having written over 500 calypsoes in a 30-year career, artists such as The Mighty Sparrow, Baron and Machel Montano have performed his music. With superior expertise and experience in the music sector, Mr. Devine was selected to mentor in the field of Songwriting, Music Composition and Arrangement.



The trinidad + tobago film festival (ttff) celebrates film from and about the Caribbean and its diaspora, as well as from world cinema, through an annual festival and year-round screenings. We continue to recognize the mentors who contributed to the success of the second instalment of the Mentoring by the Masters Programme in 2014.






We extend appreciation to the mentors who participated in the inaugural of the Mentoring by the Masters Programme in 2013.



# Artist Brief for the Production of Sculptural Trophies

The Culture Division at the Ministry of Community Development, Culture and the Arts introduced the Mentoring by the Masters Programme in 2012 during the 50th Anniversary of Independence celebrations.

The programme resonates with a sense of appreciating the generational transmission of our local heritage relative to practices and processes in the arts and culture. Thus this award was inspired by the work of the late Ken Morris, who has contributed to the local art community and his aesthetic has had a great influence on its design.

The concept behind the design is to showcase how the processes of teaching and learning allow for the continuity of knowledge. Two figures are portrayed as equals, looking upwards, pursuing greatness and sharing in that experience, and this is indicative of what could come out of the Mentoring by the Masters programme, both for the mentors and the mentees. The design is figurative but not gender specific.

The trophies are free standing three dimensional sculptures/structures crafted in Copper (metal) and placed on a wooden base with wooden accessory. The trophies stand fourteen (14) inches high. The Copper was sourced locally and the trophies were fashioned by Copper craftsman, Glendon Morris, the son of the late Ken Morris. Lacquer coating was added to protect the metal from oxidation.
